



Section 2 Programme description

2.1 Rationale/ justification

Violence against children and women is a national problem and demands several levels of intervention at prevention, treatment and response levels. For instance, the results of the MICS3 (2006) notes that 74% of children aged 2-14 years were subjected to at least one form of psychological or physical punishment and a report of the CPA Guyana (2014) noted that were over 2,000 reports of child abuse alone for the period of 2014. Further, the Committee on the CRC (2014) in its report to Guyana underscored the need to address violence against children.

In spite of the above, other official, consolidated national data is largely absent, data generated by H&S, the Childcare and Protection Agency and through the last project intervention notes that within communities, at least half of the population is aware of and experienced violence- whether as a victim (e.g. the use of corporal punishment) or bystander (e.g. domestic violence). For example, through the community- based counselling



component, 161 children were provided services, with 61 remaining as current clients of the H&S.

Nationally, efforts have been made to ensure that a national plan of action on both the Sexual Offences Act 2010 and the Domestic Violence Act 2006 and the establishment of protocols under the Sexual Offences Act 2010. Regrettably, these documents are still in draft. On other types of violence, corporal punishment still remains legal, Guyana remains at tier 2 on the TIP Watchlist and there is anecdotal evidence that exploitation and neglect are also a major cause for concern. Further, there is an element of "silence" around sexual abuse, which has- in part- hindered the nation from understanding the true scope and magnitude of the issue.

In spite of the above, there is scope and willingness to capitalise on work at the community level to "Break the Silence" on violence and especially on child sexual abuse. This is urgently needed and will build on the model and experience of past interventions and the toolkit provided by UNICEF on BTS. This programme is relevant to national priorities since it will seek to provide the needed momentum to continue work on addressing violence and eventually lead to change from the community level to national levels.

2.2 Expected results

The table below defines the programme results framework (results and their link to results defined in the country programme plan; specific indicators, baselines, targets and MOV for each programme output).

For child protection, the 2 key results as defined by the country programme action plan with the Government of Guyana (2012-2016) are as follows:

- Priority issues in child protection are addressed through the development of evidence based plan, legislations, guidelines and M&E systems
- Enhanced national capacity in the development and implementation of evidence based child protection programmes with attention to areas of disparities

The expected results of this agreement contributed to the two Country Programme level results mentioned as above and are:

- 1. Community based action on VaC through the development and use of protocols
- 2. Increased in awareness on VAC

2.3 Gender, Equity and Sustainability

Violence against women and children refers to any act of gender-based violence that results in, or is likely to result in, physical, sexual and psychological harm to women and girls, whether occurring in private or in public. This form of gender-based violence includes sexual violence. Therefore, this proposal takes into consideration violence against girls, boys, women and to some extent men.

The programme targets, 4 communities (1 in an interior location) which will seek to address some matters of equity (e.g. location). For Guyana, violence affects children from all ethnic backgrounds and as such no particular equitable considerations (based on ethnicity) are included in this programme.

On sustainability, strong, committed partners at every level are critical for the success and the sustainability of any programme. While, there can be no funding commitment on the part of H&S, given the limited funding environment, the involvement of the communities and the development of strong community ownership with be instrumental in ensuring both knowledge transfer and follow-up of community-based action plans. Additionally to aid in the sustainability of the programme, monitoring is set built into the programme including continued community monitoring at the end of the formal activities of the programme.

Additionally, the sustainability considerations are addressed through the development of community action plans and the inclusion of a minor programme component for monitoring of the programmes.





2.4 Partner's contribution	For H&S: The board/management will provide quality assurance and oversight to the programme and partner with the financial focal point to ensure that all disbursements are properly accounted for and kept in line with Harmonised Approach to Cash Transfers1. The Project Officer will be responsible for coordinating and facilitating all of the activities outlined in the Small Scale Funding Agreement. The M&E Officer, in close collaboration with the Project Officer, will measure progress, discuss challenges and ensure that the project implemented in line with the set objectives through close partnership with the community facilitators and community mobilisers.
2.5 Other partners involved	Accordingly, the main partners of the project include the government (Ministry of Human Social Protection, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Public Security and the Guyana Police Force) and civil society (religious institutions with the communities and community-based groups operating with the communities- especially those working for/with children and women. This core team-which will be managed through Help and Shelter- will be responsible for ensuring a multi-disciplinary approach/multi-sector approach for the realisation of the project results. No activity in this proposal will be subcontracted to another entity.
