1. PROGRAMME RESULTS

1.1 PROGRESS:

Describe briefly your assessment of progress made by your organization in achieving Outputs expected for the year:

The Project was successfully implemented at the beginning of the year. A KAP survey was conducted in the communities of Hague Front and Hague Back. Informing the relevant agencies and Regional officials, launching of the project, appointing community mobilizers, setting up steering committees, acquiring the use of school buildings for project activities and purchasing of equipment for the Project was done.

Community coordinators and steering committee members were sensitized in various topics: Self, Gender, Domestic Violence-Types, Web of Abuse, Entrapment and the Domestic Violence Act.

A Profile of the Hague Community was done.

Awareness sessions were conducted at different locations. Some topics discussed at these sessions are: Self: Who am I? Self esteem, Self – confidence, Gender, GBV, Domestic Violence, Healthy Relationships, Child Abuse, Assertiveness & Refusal Skills, Role Models, Healthy Lifestyles etc

The workshops, fun day, health fair and Edutainment session assisted residents to feel more comfortable to participate in project activities.

In August, 2008 a new Project coordinator was appointed, the project expanded to the community of Zeelugt, another community mobilizer was appointed for the community of Zeelugt.

A counselling outstation of Help and Shelter was set up in Zeelugt to counsel victims of domestic violence and child abuse.

Capacity building workshops were also held for teachers on domestic violence and child abuse prevention, for community women on parenting and counselling skills and for youth on a number of issues. (see details in report)

Community Mapping was done for the Communities of Hague Back and Zeelugt.

Quarterly review meetings were held with UNFPA liaison Officer Ms. Patrice La Fleur, Management Committee, and Project Coordinators to discuss matters relating to the Project.

Monthly management committee meetings and community based meetings were conducted to discuss matters relates to project activities.

List specific achievements of this project:

KAP survey to determine the situation of GBV in the community on Hague was administered, analysed, documented and is being used to plan relevant activities for reduction of GBV

Thirty (30) women are now empowered with a skills in floral arranging & pastry making Eighty five (85) women are now educated on Parenting Skills

Seven women (7) were trained in basic counselling skills as a means of assisting others in their communities to prevent & find solutions to problems of GBV, child abuse, relationship/marital problems etc

Thirty eight (38) youth development and awareness sessions were conducted for the year. A total of 276 youth (87 males and 187 females) participated in these sessions

Nine (9) Gender Awareness Sessions were conducted for the year, a total of 133 (7 males and 126 females) participated

A counselling service was opened in August, 2008 at Zeelugt one day per week. A total of 28 persons were counselled (5 males and 23 females)

Five (5) teachers were educated on Domestic Violence and child abuse: its effects on members of society and how to assist vulnerable children in the schools and communities. Project collaborated with the MOH to host a Health Fair in the community of Hague. A total of 130 persons benefited from 8 health booths set up at Hague Primary School-Diabetes, hypertension, filarial and HIV testing was made available as was dental care services, food & nutrition information and an edutainment done for youth on alcohol and drug abuse.

3 1 day youth workshops were held to empower and sensitize youth on issues of gender, GBV, healthy relationships, creative skills were also taught such as tie-dyeing and weaving

1.4 LESSONS LEARNED:

List any lessons learned through implementation of this project:

Community mobilizing requires patience and consistency

Importance of finding relevant & appropriate strategies & activities to gain the trust and support of community residents

Project activities implemented increased the self confidence of participants and women also benefited from skills training and capacity building. Friendships were forged and experiences shared among project participants and project team members.

Many persons who are experiencing Domestic Violence are not willing to talk about it openly. However the results of the KAP survey indicated that there exists high levels of verbal abuse among women (56%-70%) and men (45%), high levels of physical abuse (47%-50%) among women and relatively high levels of emotional abuse among women (23%-45%) and among men (27%).

Effects of domestic violence on women showed that 48% experienced depression, 19% experienced suicidal thoughts and 40% suffered physical injuries. The majority of women

who experienced some form of physical or emotional trauma 69% however did not seek medical services or help. In some cases they said they could not afford this or seeking outside assistance would bring shame or put them at risk for further violence.

The majority of women and men experiencing domestic violence first opted to disclose personal experiences of this to family members and mainly female family members. Survivors also reported to police or told religious leaders or neighbours.

The #1 reason given by women for their husband/partner violent behaviour was excessive alcohol consumption, other reasons identified were anger, financial problems & extra marital affairs.

Both women 93% and men 82% were of the view that DV was unacceptable and both men and women were willing to assist persons at risk. However 82% of men and 40% of women thought that women were to blame for the violence they experienced.

57% of women and 455 of men had witnessed DV as children. This shows that the cycle of domestic violence continues and is being passed on from parent to child in this community.

It is very difficult to attract men to Gender Awareness Sessions, since they feel the Project is there to help women and children.

The easiest and most responsive group to work with has been youth in both communities

Literacy among women is a problem in both the communities of Hague & Zeelugt. As such awareness sessions & workshops have had to take this into account in delivery of training and awareness sessions

Given the training, tools and confidence women demonstrated the ability to take on the role of community trainers and facilitators

2. CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT RESULTS

2.1 CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT:

Skills training for livelihood development	1. Fifteen (15) women from Zeelugt were trained in pastry making, as a means of improving livelihoods skills through income generating training activities. 2. Fifteen (15) women from Hague Back were trained in floral arrangements as a means of improving livelihoods through income generation and skill training activities Poverty and lack of skills even though not a cause of domestic violence can be a risk factor and one of the reason for entrapment in domestic violence situations for many women in Guyana. By acquiring skills women at risk

	of GBV stand a better chance of increased financial independence.
Capacity Building- Parenting Workshop	1. Eight (8) women from Hague & Zeelugt benefited from a 4 day capacity building Parenting Workshop This workshop not only taught parenting skills but also aimed to develop the skills of participants to train other women and men in their communities in aspects of parenting. As a result a further sixty seven (67) other women at the community level benefited from similar parenting sessions facilitated by the original 8 women trained. Parenting and the lack of parenting skills and knowledge has proved to be a major contributing factor for all forms of child abuse and child neglect in Guyana. As such equipping women with such skills has enhanced parent child relationships, increased trust and communication between parents and their children, developed alternative nonabusive ways of disciplining children.
Introduction to Counselling Workshop	2. Seven (7) women mostly from Zeelugt benefited from a 3 ½ day Introduction to Counselling Workshop. The workshop exposed women to issues of GBV including child abuse, taught basic counselling skills, safety tips for potential victims of GBV and available referral services. As a result women trained will be able to listen to problems at the community level and be able to advice or refer to relevant services for assistance Seven women were trained as semi/lay counsellors to assist vulnerable persons in their community; to access professional services or empower persons at risk of GBV to change their situations. KAP survey indicated that many survivors of GBV very often opted to deal with their problems within family or community circles. As such a community based lay counsellors would play an important role in assisting such persons at risk.
Domestic Violence and Child Abuse Prevention Workshop for Teachers	4. Nursery & Primary school teachers in Hague benefited from a 2 day workshop on domestic violence and child abuse. This workshop aimed to enhance the capacity of teachers to identify and better deal with issues of child abuse in their schools and to

2.3 PROGRAMME MANAGEMENT AND COORDINATION:

Describe briefly your assessment of the overall management and coordination of project activities:

The overall management of the project and coordination of project activities was successful even though challenging at times. Mid way through 2008 a new project coordinator was employed as out previous coordinator was into her final year at UG and was finding it very difficult to devote the amount of time needed for the job. Luckily we found a capable and suitable replacement resulting in a seamless transition. Management and coordination of the project have continued to benefit from monthly evaluation and planning meetings by the project team made up of project coordinator, management team, community coordinators, financial officer and counsellor. Activities are planned on a quarterly basis, and community coordinators and facilitators work in close cooperation with the management committee. Major challenges to the management and overall coordination of project activities have been:

- The setting up and sustainability of properly functioning community based steering committees. Progress has been slow and at times frustrating as persons seem reluctant to take on this task.
- Effort to penetrate the religious community have proved difficult as there seems to be some suspicion on the part of some religious groups about getting involved with the project. However recently there has been some promising development in this regards. New strategies should be devised with a view to address domestic violence within the religious communities.
- Identifying male facilitators for targeting and reaching men. Finding effective strategies to reach men could result in a significant amount of male benefiting from the project.
- Adequate funding for building capacity within our target communities for sustainability of the project.

Skills Training in income generating skills for 30 women in communities of Hague (4) & Zeelugt (4)

Community Counselling Services to address GBV & other social problems (once per week, target $\,60$ clients) at Zeelugt

Capacity building/skills training workshop for:

- (i) Teachers & community leaders in Hague in Basic Counselling Skills & GBV Prevention (10 persons)
- (ii) Project Staff, Steering Committees and Community Mobilizers. (20 persons)
- (iii) Peer educator training workshops for community members & community mobilizers (25 persons)
- (iv) Parenting Training for women & men in communities of Hague & Zeelugt (35 persons)
