Community/Group & Individual Responses to Visits:

Attendance at Religious Leaders Workshop- 8th & 9th February

• Attendance at Religious Leaders Workshop from community of Kaneville was poor. A total of 5 persons, 3 females and 2 males attended. A total of 614 H&S leaflets were distributed to persons attending the workshop.

Elections of New Steering Committee of the Kaneville Development Group – 13th February

• A total of 24 residents, 16 females and 8 males attended the meeting. After a late start 6 new steering committee members were elected. The Youth Officer from the Ministry of Culture, Youth & Sport was invited to attend and informed the meeting about the opportunities available for groups registered with the Ministry.

Formation of Youth Club- 14th February

• A total of 13 young women between the ages of 11-23 attended the meeting and are willing to be registered as a Club. They are already engaged in playing cricket competitions with other females along the East Bank area. The CE and CM are hoping to have groups formed so as to promote positive ways of interacting while at the same time raising consciousness on reducing GBV.

One on One Meetings/Raising Awareness with Residents – 15th, 27th, 28th February

• On the 15th February the CE and CM spent 4 hours interacting with a total of 35 residents, 22 females and 13 males on issues of DV and sharing out H&S leaflets. Most of the residents were knowledgeable about the abuse taking place in and around the

community. Many residents also shared their need for material assistance. One resident showed the CE and CM his arm which he claimed had been broken twice. He also said he needed help to build a better home which was a shack flat on the ground. He was referred to the Ministry of Human Services, Difficult Circumstances Unit and advised to check with NIS for disability benefits.

- On the **27**th **February** a total of 19 young residents, 18 males and 1 female between the ages of 11-23 were met with by the CE and CM. The youth were very open in sharing their thoughts on DV and discussing ways in which persons help in the promotion of DV. Sex and sexual relations were also touched on and the CE was asked to provide condoms. A total of 19 H&F Fact Sheets were distributed at the same time.
- On the 28th February the CE, CM and a steering committee member walked the community meeting and interacting with 43 residents, 21 females and 22 males. One resident reached had her right breast removed and was unable to walk without holding on to something for support. She lives with her son and was very pleased for the visit. The H&S team also met with other residents and shared information about H&S and the GBV reduction project. Most of the residents reached expressed their need for finances, clothes and help to repair or build their homes. Some persons believed that H&S provides assistance in such areas and were somewhat disappointed when the H&S team explained the work and services that the organization provides. H&S leaflets were also distributed to residents during this community outreach activity.

Counselling of Resident – 21st February

• A follow up visit was made to a grandmother who had raised her granddaughter from infancy and whose mother now wanted her back. She was advised to get help from the Ministry of Human Services.

Meeting with Participants from the Religious Leaders Workshop – 24th February

• The CE had previously met with Ms Nurse and agreed to visit Diamond later that week to discuss the implementation on the project in the area. The meeting was very encouraging a total of 7 women were present who were full of zeal to start work in the community. Areas discussed were team work, managing anger, ice breakers, interacting with clients (confidentiality etc). The CE and CM were motivated by the enthusiasm the worn showed. They also promised to have a list of networking agencies, flyers, and posters available for the group. A total of 450 H&S leaflets were also distributed

Steering Community Meeting – 25th February

• A total of 9 persons, 6 females and 3 males attended the first meeting of the newly elected steering committee. Discussions centered around plans for the community. The time for the statutory meeting has been changed from 17:00 to 17:30 hrs to facilitate persons who work. The new Chairman has pledged to fix the H&S banner that has been erected and has been loose and flapping in the wind. It was also agreed to host awareness sessions in the community. The Vice-Chair man asked the CE to donate files, notebooks and pens for the new members of the committee. The CE was also asked to provide a list of duties for the executive of the group.

Meeting with Peer Educators – 26th February

• A total of 4 peer educators, 2 male and 2 female between the ages of 13-15 attended the meeting to evaluate work done so far and continuing work. The turn out was disappointing and one of the teachers informed the CE and CM that the peer educators

had not done any further work. He promised to encourage them to continue the awareness sessions. Plans were made to continue awareness sessions with students at IPE.

Evaluation of Awareness Sessions

Den Amstel Pre-Natal Clinic –Suicide – 4th February

• A total of 23 mothers and 1 father between the ages of 16-32 participated in this 3 hr session on Alcohol Abuse.

The facilitator outlined the short term and long term effects of alcohol abuse on the body such as effects on brain, blood vessels, heart, liver and stomach. Participants were asked a series of questions to assess attitudes, behaviours and risks associated with drinking. Participants discussed their use of alcohol before they became pregnant, the different types of alcohol they consumed and the effects this had on them. Participants also spoke of the consumption of alcohol by their husbands/partners; how often they drank, types of alcohol they drank, how they felt about their husbands/partners use of alcohol, how their partners/husbands behaved when they drank alcohol, how their partners behaved to them and their children when and after drinking alcohol and if this behaviour was different to them and children when they did not drink alcohol. At the start of the session many of the women were ashamed to speak about their situation and experiences but as information was given they became more comfortable and shared deeply.

Evaluation of the session showed that participation, understanding of topic discussed, facilitation and the session overall were all rated as excellent.

Congregational Youth Group – Suicide – 7th February

• A total of 40 young people, 25 females and 15 males between the ages of 10-23 participated in this 3hr hour session on suicide.

During the session a definition of suicide was given and discussions held on who commits suicide, what methods persons use to commit suicide and reason for this, how suicidal persons feel, where people can go to for help and what we can do to help suicidal persons. Feedback indicated that 88%, 35 out of the 40 youth present said they had thought about committing suicide more than seven times. Twenty five (25) or 63% said they had attempted suicide more than once but were rescued by someone. Some of the reasons young people gave as to why they wanted to commit suicide included child physical abuse, feeling neglected by parents, friends, and family members, because of partner/spousal relationship problems, feelings of resentment. Participants also knew of friends who attempted suicide including some who committed suicide and died. Before this session the youth did not have in-depth information on suicide so they didn't know what to do when they felt suicidal or what to do if friend or family member or someone they came into contact with was suicidal. By the end of the session they felt that they were better equipped to know what to do and were willing to make full use of the information given including working on building their own self esteem and knowledge so that they would be better able to help others.

Nursery Teachers Cluster Workshop – Child Neglect – 16th February

• A total of 29 female Nursery School teachers from various schools in Region 3 participated in this 2 hr session on Child Neglect.

During the session information was shared on definition of neglect, different types of child neglect i.e. social, educational, emotional, physical, signs of neglect, behaviours associated with neglect and reasons for neglect. This information was new to most of the teachers as they were unaware of the different types of neglect and the consequences of these. Teachers said they gained new knowledge about the different behaviours of children and learnt new coping skills. They also indicated that they would use the information to sensitize parents in their schools as to how to help their children at home; since some parents may be unaware that they are neglecting their child/children and the effects of this in the future. One teacher also disclosed that she has a few children in her class who are slow learners and now she would know what to do and how to work with these children. Teachers also identified some of the problems they see at school such as

parents not providing nutritional snacks for children, poor condition of school clothes children are sent to school with and parents not addressing the special educational needs of some of their children. Teachers requested further awareness sessions be done with them and for session to also be done with PTAs.

Evaluation of the session showed that participation, understanding of topics discussed, facilitation and the session overall were all rated as excellent by participants.

Cornelia Ida Orphanage – Teenage Pregnancy – 18th February

A total of 16 residents, 13 females and 3 males participated in a 3 hr awareness session on teenage pregnancy. Information was shared on causes of teenage pregnancy which were identified as including child sexual abuse, media influences, neglect, peer pressure, poverty and effects of teenage pregnancy such as pregnancy complications which can lead to death or disability, premature births, low birth weight etc, having to drop out of school, unemployment, etc. At the start of the session the teenagers were afraid to speak out but gained more courage to express their feelings as the session progressed. They came up with a definition of teenage pregnancy and the causes and effects of teenage pregnancy. The participants disclosed that the house parents at the orphanage talk to them about teenage pregnancy but only on the surface and not in depth. They did not know what would happen if they got pregnant while at the orphanage but thought they might have to leave or if they were willing to change they might get a second chance to stay on. The participants said they know of teens who became pregnant while at school, had to leave school and did not get an opportunity to continue their studies. They were pleased to have this information shared with them and said they will use it to educate the rest of their brothers and sisters who live in the orphanage and their peer at school.

Evaluation of the session indicated that participation and facilitation were assessed as very good while understanding of the topic discussed and the session overall were assessed as excellent

Kingdom Connection Youth – Drug Abuse –21st February

• Fourteen (14) youth, 8 females and 6 males between the ages of 12-34 participated in the 3 hr session on Drug Abuse.

Five of the young people admitted they tried marijuana once. Reasons included peer pressure from friends, uncle offered drug and one youth said he just wanted the experience for himself. Two (2) young women also disclosed that they had taken over doses of medicinal drugs. Youth said that the types of drugs used most in the community are cocaine, alcohol and marijuana. The participants spoke of seeing friends, family members and other community residents using drugs and the dangers of this. The youth who admitted to trying marijuana once and those who overdosed on medicinal drugs plan not to repeat this as the experience was not good. Other youth said the session made them better equipped to deal with the pressure of experimenting with drugs.

Evaluation of the session showed that participation, understanding of topics discussed, facilitation and the session overall were all rated as excellent by participants.

Religious Leaders Workshop – 15th & 16th February

• A total of 17, 15 female and 2 male religious leaders/church members participated in the 2 day workshop.

Community/Group & Individual Responses to Visits:

House to House Visits & One on One Discussions with Residents – 5th, 15th, 18th, 19th, 25th, 26th February

• During the visit on the 5th February, a single parent of 3 children, 2 boys, 1 girl between the ages of 3-9 was reached. None of the 3 children are presently attending school and their living conditions are unhealthy and unsafe. The children appeared to be unkempt and are often left unsupervised. The father appeared to have little or no schooling so the CM read H&S leaflet on child neglect carefully explaining the seriousness of the situation and the effects this can have on his children. It was learnt that the father is the biological father of the 2 youngest children and stepfather of the other. The mother of the children is terminally ill and is living elsewhere with relatives. Recently the stepson was beaten and lashed across head by an uncle of the other two children for not washing a pot. A neighbour came to his rescue. The father was informed about how to get the children into school and told about assistance he can access from H&S.

On a follow up visit on **February 25** to this family the mother was visiting so the CM spoke to the mother about the children not going to school and learnt that the mother herself had very little schooling. However the mother wanted her children to get an education which she had not. The mother also said she had been trying to get the children into a home but without success. She is terminally ill and said she would not like to die without having her children properly taken care of. She left her contact number and promised her full cooperation for the benefit of her children. Persons from the Ministry of Human Services had visited the home to investigate reports of child abuse and neglect. The father appeared to be concerned that the children would be removed and he would not be able to see them again. The matter was discussed with the CE.

- During the visit on **February 15**, the CM and a peer educator met with a family of 3 and discussed DV, child abuse, wife abuse and alcohol abuse. The son admitted that he stopped drinking as he became aware of the damaging effects this was having on the home such as having to replace things he had broken while under the influence of alcohol. He and his wife also shared their concern about their 10 year old son who seemed not to be learning much at school. The couple was encouraged to keep him in school as long as possible and later he could maybe learn a trade. The father himself had little education and the mother never went to school. The grandmother expressed her wish for the project to be taken to Friendship where her 5 grandchildren live, the eldest at 13 years was taken out of school to take care of her younger siblings including a baby of 2 months. The other 3 younger children had never attended school. H&S was complimented for the work being conducted in this community. A total of 5 H&S leaflets were also distributed.
- On **February 18**, a household of 6 were visited a mother, daughter and daughter's 4 children. The last child a baby of 2 months died 4 days before. It was apparent that the mother is abusive and neglectful towards her children and the grandmother. The children all look malnourished and 2 appear to be underdeveloped. The 2 month old child, who died, had been left with the other 3 children while the mother went to work, the grandmother was at the time in hospital. One of the children by mistake gave the baby medicine in her mouth which was supposed to have been given in her nostril. The oldest child who is 11 told the CM that her mother denies her food. The mother admitted to this but said this is punishment for the child's disobedience. The 11 yr old also said that her mother would hold her hands and allow her brother to cuff her in her back. The mother also admitted to doing this because she said the "child don't hear". The 11 yr old also on the day of the visit had to wash her clothes without any soap. A great aunt, who lives upstairs, confirmed what the 11 yr old disclosed and said she would give the child food whenever this happens. The children all look unkempt and don't seem to have enough clothes to wear as one child was seen naked and on enquiring the CM was told that the child does not have any clothes to wear. There is a stench of urine which comes from the house as you get close. One day one of the children was seen vomiting what looked to be worms and the eldest sister the 11 yr old was told to clean it up. The father of the children does not provide any financial support and the mother earns \$3,000 per month doing domestic work, The CM spoke to the mother about her abuse and neglect of her children and mother and explained that her 11 vr old daughter behaves in the way she does because of how she has been treated and what she has witnessed. Help for this family was requested.
- On February 26 during another house to house visit two homes where DV takes place were identified. At one of the homes the husband was placed before the Court for

chopping his reputed wife. At the other home the husband is an alcoholic and when he is drinking the wife would move out of the house.

House to House Visit – 26th January

• Interaction was held with a family in which the husband drinks alcohol almost every day and in his drunken state abuses his wife. It was reported that sometimes the husband chases his wife around the yard with his cutlass. The wife was given H&S leaflets and advised to share them with her husband and her children. She was also advised to contact H&S where she can access counselling services.

House to House Visits - Squatting Area & Island. – 27th January

Evaluation of Awareness Sessions

Cluster Workshop for Nursery School Teachers on EBD – Self – 8th February

• A total of 25 female Nursery School teachers, between the ages of 20-53 participated in this 2 ½ hr session on Self Concept.

The session was well attended and very interactive. The teachers were from Mocha, Providence, Eccles, and Prospect/Covent Garden Nursery Schools. Teachers were placed into groups of 2 and asked to introduce their respective partner, this was a fun activity since they all got a chance to learn new things about their co-workers. Activities encouraged participants to accumulate knowledge about self, personality traits, beliefs, physical characteristics, abilities, values, goals and roles they played. One teacher shared her view that a person's self concept can change as you experience and understand things differently depending on beliefs and attitude. Another teacher expressed how happy she was to be exposed to such information and identified a case of abuse in her area, which was referred to MLHSSS, which is to be followed up. A request was made for similar sessions to be held.

Evaluation of the session showed that participation, understanding of the topic discussed, facilitation and the session overall were all rated as very good by participants.

A total of 50 H&S Fact Sheets and leaflets on child abuse were distributed.

Covent Garden Secondary School Form 4 Science Students – Alcohol Use – 12th February

• A total of 23 students, 20 girls and 3 boys ages 16+ participated in the 3hr session on Alcohol Use.

The students were very excited to participate in the session and as soon as the facilitators arrived lab coats came off and they were ready and eager for the session. Information was shared on the effects of alcohol on the body. To the surprise of the facilitators most of the students claimed to have consumed alcohol of some sort previously at social events such as birthdays, weddings, Christmas etc. Five body parts were selected-the brain, stomach, blood vessel, heart and liver and students were put into pairs and asked to identify the long and short term effects of alcohol on these body parts. The session was highly participatory and a lot of questions were asked about under age drinking, the legal age for drinking alcohol etc. Importantly students were given a chance to observe that alcohol abuse is not only an adult problem but also a problem affecting teenagers and young people.

Evaluation of the session showed that participation was excellent while understanding of topics discussed, facilitation and the session overall were all rated as very good. A total of 50 H&S Fact Sheets and leaflets on Alcohol Use were distributed.

Covent Garden Residents – DV & Gender Roles – 19th February

• The CE and CM targeted the Sea Dam and the Covent Garden Squatting area. Six homes, one shop and a corner stand were visited altogether a total of 13 residents, 8 females and 5 males participated in these discussions.

At one home 3 men were seen drinking alcohol at a shop they were approached and shared their experiences, the owner of the shop also came and joined the group. The men spoke of how gender roles in society have undergone a sea change. Although the men were against DV one still felt that if the wife is not finished cooking when the husband returns from work "she needs licks". Another man suggested that the punishment for not having food ready should be no money for the week. This opinion was challenged by the CE and CM who explained the reasons why this was not acceptable behaviour. The men said they had no problem doing any type of chores in the home or assisting in any way in the home.

The second stop was at a corner stand, however, since the young women selling at the stand was busy attending to customers the CE and CM promised to visit her at another time when she was less busy.

A visit was also made to the home of the mother who claimed her son abuses her daughter in law; unfortunately he was out so H&S leaflets were left with the family.

The other family where the children are not going to school was also visited again. Time was spent stressing the importance of having an education. The parents shared that of the 6 children only 2 have birth certificates. This was given as the reason for the other 4 not attending school. On checking with the relevant authorities at the School Welfare Division it was learnt that children no longer need birth certificates for registration at schools. A meeting was set for March 5th with the mother, father, 4 children and School Welfare. Arrangements were put in place to have the family collected and taken to the School Welfare Office and returned to their home.

A total of 45 H&S leaflets on Child Abuse, DVA and H&S Fact Sheet were distributed.

Steering Committee Meeting – 22nd February

• A total of 6 persons were in attendance at this first meeting. Four residents of Covent Garden including the CM, the CE and the M&E Officer. The meeting started with a welcome being done by the CE which was followed by an outline of the role of the steering committee and its functions, who should be a part of the steering committee and the need for commitment on the part of steering committee members to the aim and objective of the project as well as other activities for community development. A number of suggestions were made as to what can be done to enhance the community and meet the needs of the less fortunate in the community.
